

Life Around Sanders, Arizona

Skyline owns land in the Sanders area of northern Apache County, high desert plains right off Interstate 40 with easy access and wide open space. Here's a feel for what's around and what life looks like out here.

THE SETTING

High desert plains off I-40

This is flat to gently rolling high desert plains, juniper, pinon pine, and sage, sitting around 5,800 to 6,000 feet. The town of Sanders sits right at Interstate 40 and US 191, near the New Mexico border.

Sanders sits right off I-40, about 5 minutes from the exit, so this land is genuinely easy to reach whether you're coming from Phoenix, Albuquerque, or out of state. No long haul down rough back roads to get to the highway.

GETTING AROUND

What's nearby

Interstate 40 (Sanders exit)	about 5 min
Gallup, NM	about 40 min
St. Johns, AZ (county seat)	about 1 hour
Flagstaff, AZ	about 2 hours
Albuquerque, NM	about 2.5 hours
Phoenix, AZ	about 4 hours

Drive times are approximate and depend on your exact starting point and road conditions.

FISHING

Fishing within reach

There's no lake in Sanders itself, but you're surrounded by options. Cholla Lake to the west has bass and catfish, the White Mountains lakes to the south are full trout country, and several Navajo Nation lakes north of here are stocked too, with a tribal permit.

CAMPING AND THE OUTDOORS

I-40 access, wide open land

RV parks and campgrounds line the I-40 corridor near Holbrook and Gallup, with full hookups and easy highway access. To the north, the Navajo Nation has tribal parks like Canyon de Chelly, which require permits. Off-roaders have open BLM country south of I-40. One thing to know: much of the surrounding land is Navajo Nation, so it isn't open for general camping or roaming without a permit.

HUNTING

Open grasslands and big game

The area holds elk, mule deer, pronghorn, and turkey, with pronghorn in the open grasslands south of I-40. Public hunting is mainly south on BLM and forest land. A lot of land around Sanders is Navajo Nation, which needs separate tribal permits. Arizona hunts run on draw tags through Arizona Game and Fish, applied for in early February. Check the specific game unit for any parcel on azgfd.com.

CLIMATE

Dry, sunny, four seasons

Sanders has a cold semi-arid climate, drier than Concho. Hot dry summers, cold winters, low humidity, about 11 inches of rain and 6 of snow a year, and around 275 sunny days.

Winter	48 to 52F	22 to 27F	Cold nights, mild days, light snow
Spring	60 to 78F	32 to 48F	Mild and dry, windy at times
Summer	87 to 91F	55 to 65F	Hot dry days, cool nights
Fall	58 to 82F	30 to 50F	Comfortable and clear

WORTH KNOWING

History and big landscapes

What makes this stretch of Arizona special:

- **Petrified Forest National Park.** Out along the I-40 corridor, with the Painted Desert, ancient pueblo sites, and Route 66 history.
- **Window Rock and Canyon de Chelly.** Navajo Nation landmarks to the north, dramatic red rock and cliff dwellings.
- **Route 66 and dark skies.** Sanders sits on the historic corridor, and away from the highway the stars open right up.

SERVICES

Where to get what you need

Gallup, New Mexico to the east has a hospital, Walmart, and restaurants. Holbrook to the west has full services and Route 66 charm. St. Johns, the county seat, is south on US 191.
